By plane and train

ACCOMODATION

THINGS TO DO IN NEWPORT AND SURROUNDS: Newport, Williamstown, Yarraville, and Footscray

NEWPORT

If you're a bird watcher, bring your binoculars, as Hobsons Bay is a well-known destination for nature lovers.

Newport Fiddle and Folk Club

The Substation

<u>Location:</u> 1 Market Street, Newport – the big brick building west side of the train tracks – you can't miss it.

The Substation champions contemporary and experimental arts. Housed inside a former industrial building steeped in the rich history of Melbourne's inner west, The Substation is an arts destination unlike any other in Australia.

Sandy Point Nature Reserve

Location: A kilometer (east) from Newport Station.

Along the mud flats, migratory shorebirds visit here seasonally – the most endangered bird species in the world. Newport Lakes Park

<u>Location:</u> One kilometre, or a 15-minute walk or bus, west from Newport Station along Mason Street.

Newport Lakes is a bushland oasis created from a former bluestone quarry and rubbish tip site in the middle of busy Newport.

WILLIAMSTOWN

- This is a place with place with historic architecture, beaches and parklands boutique shopping precincts and modern funky cafes and rich maritime history. Main strip is Nelson Place. https://www.visitwilliamstown.com.au/
- Williamstown is accessible by train on the branch line. Pick up the line at Newport Station on the east side and make sure the train is going to Williamstown! There are only three stations: North Williamstown (shopping centre, library), Williamstown Beach (Botanic Gardens), Williamstown (Nelson Place).

Lantern Ghost Tours

Visit abandoned morgues, forgotten burial grounds and hidden laneways in Victoria's most historic seaport.

Williamstown Wetlands

<u>Location:</u> 97-99 Osborne Street, Williamstown - accessible by train from Newport to Williamstown and then a walk.

Edwardian gardens established in the mid 1800s. Superbly maintained. The Friends site has the best information

FOOTSCRAY

• By train - Footscray is half way between Newport and the CBD, Footscray is loved by locals for the vibe and the food: S.E. Asian, Ethiopian,

 Footscray Community Arts Centre. FCAC develop and present

Getting around Naarm on public transport, I'll say it again - you will need a myki card if you travel beyond the CBD to neighbouring spots.

All the places listed below are within the free tram zone (no MYKI needed) and with the exception of the Fairies Tree and Village, are probably within a kilometer of Flinders St Station.

The Fairies Tree

Location: Fitzroy Gardens

No 75 Tram (you can pick up opposite Flinders Street Station in Flinders Street) Stop 10 for the Fairies Tree, Village and cafe.

From 1931 to May 1934 - Ola Cohn carved likenesses of fairies, dwarfs, gnomes, a marvelous jackass, koalas, flying foxes and more into a the trunk of a 300 year old river gum.

"I have carved in a tree in the Fitzroy Gardens for you, and the fairies, but mostly for the fairies and those who believe in them, for they will understand how necessary it is to have a fairy sanctuary - a place that is sacred and safe as a home should be to all living creatures." - Ola Cohn http://www.fitzroygardens.com/Fairies_Tree.htm

The gardens are one of Melbourne's best and include a rotunda, fountains, and a superb conservatory and there is a café open seven days a week.

The Village was a gift to the City of Melbourne through the City of Lambeth, England, in appreciation of Melbourne's generosity in sending food to Britain, during the Second World War.

Spellbox and Babushka Shop are both in the Royal Arcade

Young and Jackson Hotel

<u>Location:</u> Opposite Flinders Street Station and diagonally opposite Federation Square.

Young and Jackson is Melbourne's most iconic hotel. Heritage listed, established in 1861, it has a permanent display of black and white photos of old Melbourne and is the home of Chloe.

OTHER PLACES YOU MIGHT LIKE TO VISIT: St Kilda, Carlton, Fitzroy, Brunswick, Gisborne

ST KILDA

- A short tram ride from the city (can pick up outside Flinders Street Station), St Kilda is famous for its beaches, penguins, Luna Park, Palais Theatre, Ackland Street (cakes!).
- The **Victorian Pride Centre.** Worth visiting for the architecture alone, the centre houses a theatre, gallery space, Joy FM and Hares and Hyenas Book Shop Melbourne's queer and intersectional bookshop.

CARLTON, FITZROY. BRUSWICK

- All a train ride north of the CBD.

Gisborne


Myths and Legends
